Abstract: During this seminar, Dr. Schneider will provide an overview to the different data collection approaches used for network characterization and visualization followed by the analyses that can be utilized. He will review egocentric, dyadic, two-mode and sociometric approaches that can be applied to social systems for analysis, intervention and implementation. He will provide examples from domestic and international epidemics of men who have sex with men and people who inject drugs. No prior network experience is required to participate.

Bio: Dr. John Schneider MD, MPH is an infectious disease specialist and network epidemiologist in the Departments of Medicine and Public Health Sciences at the University of Chicago. He is also Director of the University of Chicago Center for HIV Elimination (http://hivelimination.uchicago.edu/). His research focuses on how social networks can be leveraged to improve the health of at risk populations in resource restricted settings. Clinically, he specializes in HIV prevention and has a specific interest in the provision of high-quality care to younger Black men who have sex with men and transgender women. He has extensive experience with advancing the physician patient relationship in resource restricted settings, including his current clinic at a Federally Qualified Health Center on the South Side of Chicago and during his time working in Southern India.
